## Conferences, Classrooms, Cafes and Collaborations: Outreach so Far in 2015 Gina Malczewski, Chair, Midland Section ACS

The Midland Section was represented again at Pittcon Science Week in New Orleans this year (March 6-12). Two teacher workshops (Sci Tech Next Generation, Parts 1 and 2) were facilitated on separate days, followed by three mornings of student hands-on activities. Teacher feedback was very positive. We organized and led a first of its kind event on 3/14/15 – we celebrated **SCI PI Day** with two hours of festivities at SVSU, assisted by the SVSU Chemistry Club. About 20 students (mostly grades 5 to 8) and some parents participated in a math session (working with Pi) and in hands-on activities with light (in honor of Albert Einstein, whose birthday is March 14). In between, there was a break with – what else – pies! This opportunity comes along only once a century and was enjoyed by all. Also on March 14, the Midland Section ACS supported some science and engineering hands-on activities during the **NOBCChE Science Bowl** outside of the SVSU Ott Auditorium.

We had a successful science cafe on Cosmetic Chemistry (featuring Jason Vogel of Dow Corning) on January 10 at MCFTA (again, great feedback from attendees), and participated in Midland's "Kids Day at the Mall" event on January 17 where our gum-making activity was very popular. We also focused on "chemistry that tastes good" during three days of after-school science at Jefferson Middle School, Northeast Intermediate and the Midland Community Center in early February. Featured items were popcorn, cotton candy, marshmallows and bubble gum.

Our "Science Day" activities for six gifted classes at Kolb Elementary (Bay City) were postponed February 19 due to school closure, but we are hoping to reschedule. "Carnival Science" was presented to several classes at the end of February for "SPARK Day" (Science Plus Art Reaching Kids) at Hemmeter School in Saginaw. Dave Stickles once again led our effort to participate in "Education Day with the Saginaw Spirit" on March 3.

We are spending two days at Midland High School in April doing Alka Seltzer reactions, and offering polymer hands-on demos at St. Thomas Aquinas in Saginaw on April 24. A Food Science Cafe is planned for May 7, with a location targeted for Bay City but not yet confirmed, so stand by for further announcements! ## Councilor's Report, 249<sup>th</sup> ACS National Meeting, Denver *Tina Leaym, Councilor, Midland Section ACS*

Tina Leaym and Dale LeCaptain, Councilors for the Midland Section, attended the ACS District II Councilor's Caucus meeting and the National ACS Council meeting in Denver. The information provided below is high level. If any Midland Section member is interested in more detail, please contact one of your Councilors (tina.leaym@dowcorning.com or dale.lecaptain@cmich.edu).

- The nominees for 2016 President-Elect of the American Chemical Society were narrowed from four candidates to two by vote of the Council. The candidates are:
  - G. Bryan Balazs, California Section, Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory
  - o Allison A. Campbell, Richland Section, Pacific Northwest National Laboratory

- New international chapters in Taiwan and India were approved by the Council.
- Fully escalated dues were approved. Dues will increase from \$158 in 2015 to \$162 in 2016 based on the 2.49% increase in the Consumer Price Index, Urban Wage Earners, Services Category.
- National Meeting Registration Fee Increases: There was discussion around the ACS Board of Directors' (BOD) goal to achieve "break-even" financial results at National Meetings for the technical programming. Increasing technology costs have outpaced increases in meeting registration fees, resulting in significant shortfalls. An annual incremental adjustment to the registration fee of \$15 will allow the Technical Program to break even around 2020. This can be implemented without Council approval, but a motion was made and approved for more data to be provided to Council at the Boston meeting in the fall. A couple of interesting discussion points were brought up by council members:
  - While the meeting expo was once viewed as a source of income to balance shortfalls in the technical programming, the trend is that fewer and fewer vendors see value in participating in the expo.
  - Why do we not have the option of attending the National meetings virtually? Making the programming available on-line could be a way to increase revenues.

### • <u>Bylaw Updates Under Consideration:</u>

- Petition on Member Expulsion (Bylaw I, Sec. 5)
  - The purpose is to streamline the Bylaws. Procedures for expulsion are largely removed from the Bylaws and would be promulgated by the Council Committee on Membership Affairs. Such procedures shall provide for quick resolution, fairness, confidentiality, and due process, including an opportunity for charged members to be heard.
- Petition on Preferential Voting (Bylaw V, Sec. 2, d, Sec. 3, c, Sec. 4, d and f)
  - When there are more than two candidates, this update extends the present preferential ballot system to the Directors-at-Large election. Details of the voting process would be moved from the Bylaws to procedures developed by the Committee on Nominations and Elections.

In A Neglected Obligation, by J. E. Dunbar, Editor, The Midland Chemist: "Little effort has been made by the local section, however, to enhance the scientific careers of its chemist and chemical engineer members. There is perhaps a reason for this in that the local section looks to the two chemical companies in the area to satisfy this need. Although the local companies have been very cooperative in sponsoring lectures from various universities and colleges and have in the past sponsored courses in infrared spectroscopy, the responsibility of learning new techniques falls upon the individual scientist and, collectively, upon the Midland Section of the American Chemical Society."

#### 40 Years Ago

In *The Chairman's Column,* by Alvin E. Bey: "Standing room only at an ACS lecture — Hard to believe, isn't it? But that was indeed the situation at our Midland Section March 17 program held in the Dow 566 building auditorium. Our featured speaker Dr. T. D. Coyle, speaking on "Chemistry and Flame Retardancy" provided a unique combination of general appeal information blended with some new insights into the chemical nature of burning.

In addition, the Midland Section was granted the 1974 ACS "Outstanding Performance Award" for mediumlarge sections (i.e., 500-1000 members) at the meeting.
